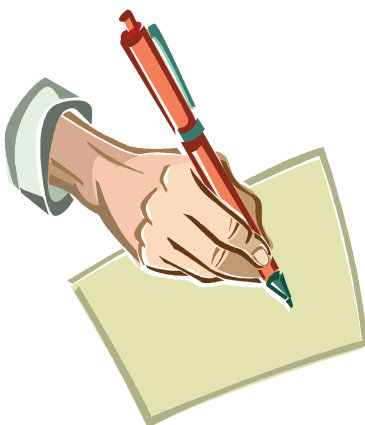

The Dissertation Research Support Program allows doctoral students to receive up to \$1,500.00 to use on their dissertation projects.

Fall deadline for applications is October 17, 2005.

The program is open to doctoral candidates who have had their dissertation prospectus approved by their



dissertation committee. Applicants must be current students.

Nine copies of the completed application must be submitted to the College of Graduate Studies by **5 p.m. Oct. 17, 2005** during the fall semester and by **5 p.m. March 3, 2006** during the spring semester. An application consists of a cover page (signed by the student and the chair of the dissertation committee) and a writ-
